TRAIN THE TRAINER: A PRESENTER'S PERSPECTIVE

I sometimes feel like I am operating my learning (tutoring) center in a vacuum. No one else on campus knows just what it takes to manage a tutoring program. No one quite understands the delicate balance between satisfying students and tutors and faculty and administration. I often question, "Am I making the right choices for our students? Are my tutors handling situations appropriately? Does administration value what we do?" I troll the Irnasst listserv, participate in webinars, and read every article I can find, but I recently discovered there is nothing comparable to talking to other tutoring managers face-to-face.

On October 16, after nine years in the field and with butterflies in my stomach, I presented "Tutoring Matters" to a group of fellow tutoring managers at GaTA's Train the Trainer event. I had carefully constructed a PowerPoint with my opinion of the seven most effective strategies to show an institution that tutoring matters. I did not know what to expect from the audience, but I was pleasantly surprised at the conversations that developed during the presentation. The group was welcoming and engaged.
